It's shaping up to be another exciting and busy summer in the Village of Fayetteville. There are so many positive things happening in the village. Before you read about all the great projects happening, I want to thank our village employees for all their talent and hard work. I want to thank each and every one of the trustees for all their efforts; if you see them out and about please take a moment and thank them. I would also like to thank you the residents and community of Fayetteville. We asked for your help with the flower beautification program last year and I was overwhelmed by the support. This year, I'm even more amazed by the support we have received. When the flowers started, I never thought they would be as popular as they have become. I'm glad to see the residents support this great project. The flowers really enhance the quality of life for everyone that sees them or drives through our village. This program could not be possible without the Beautification Committees help and the support of the residents. Thank You.

As you read this newsletter we are in the final stages of starting several projects in the village. These projects have either been paid for by grants, village reserve funds set aside for years in the budget process, or have been budgeted in the upcoming fiscal year

**The Limestone Plaza "Save the Rain" grant, that the village was awarded \$360,000 for, is our most noteworthy project of the summer.** This project includes rain gardens, porous pavement, new detention basins, rain barrels, and several street and parking improvements in the Limestone Plaza area of the village.

This area has seen tremendous growth over the last few years. We had been working on a new traffic enhancement plan for the area when the grant program came out. This grant will now allow us to make these traffic enhancements and better maintain the runoff from rain and storms while costing the village very little in tax dollars due to the grant's 100% funding. There will be more to come about this project but our plan is to start in the fall as soon as the plans are finalized.

Throughout this newsletter you will see many other projects happening in Fayetteville this summer. Please take note of these projects and be aware that the village is working on several projects that may not be written about, or seen, but are just as important to the longevity and prosperous future of the village. These projects, plus the everyday activity in the village, are what make the Village of Fayetteville such a special place to live and raise a family. 
## Village Parks Projects

“Plans for Phase II of Canal Landing Park which includes adding a bridge over Limestone Creek have begun. We have hired a firm to draw up plans, and I’m pleased to announce that we will be using DPW forces along with local contractors to help us with this project. The Village will be the GC for this project which will enable us to maximize the grant dollars that we were awarded. It will also give us the flexibility to make the necessary changes that this project will most likely need as we start. The Parks Commission is working very hard on this project. I want to thank them for their time and talents. We’re looking forward to residents utilizing this bridge and seeing what this bridge will mean to the park and our community.

The Parks Commission is also working on several other important projects in the village park system. Soon there will be new signage, walls fixed at Beard Park, enhancements to Duguid Park as well as many other great enhancements. These projects are all funded through a parks reserve fund that the village established. This reserve fund has been used on several projects in the village and the Board of Trustees has been adding to it during the budget process to maintain this vital part of our community.”

**Happy Spring; Enjoy the summer time by taking advantage of our fantastic parks and sidewalks throughout the village:**

**Solicitors:** Please take advantage of placing a "No Solicitors" sign on the main entrance to your home. Unfortunately it is not legal for us to deny solicitation, due to judicial opinions in the village. If there is an issue with a solicitor that you feel is out of line, call the police, the village office, or one of us.

**Codes:** I have been appointed as liaison to the Codes Department and the Planning, Zoning, and Historical Boards. Trustee Duggleby will share this duty with me. When you notice violations or question a situation that does not seem right make us aware. We will follow up and let you know what action has taken place. Questions regarding projects on your property can be answered by calling the village office.

**Recreation:** Sign-ups for the summer recreation programs are in two week blocks, and sign-ups for your children can be for 2 weeks, 4 weeks, or for all 6 weeks. It is a fun time for all, with many activities at a reasonable cost.

**Assessments:** While many of us had our property assessments raised, the letter "2012 Assessment Notification" from the Assessor's office, while accurate in some respects is misleading. It is true that the assessor does not set tax rates. However, if the tax rate is static, the amount owed does increase. So when entities who establish tax rates indicate that there is no tax increase, the amount owed does go up due to the increased assessment. If you own property in the village, your total taxes paid for each \$1000.00 of increased assessment goes up approximately \$40.00.

## Route 5 Culvert Replacement

We know that many residents are concerned about the temporary closure of Route 5 this summer and we realize, just as you do, that it will affect traffic in our area. NYS DOT has indicated that they are taking precautions such as barriers for the adjacent neighborhood to block outside traffic, talking with the police department, and adjusting traffic lights where necessary.

"This project entails replacing a defective pipe on NYS Route 5 near Brookside. This is a state project, and while the village has very little input on the project but we are working to make sure our voice is loud and clear. While we understand this has to be replaced, we would like to ensure that the safety of our residents and the quality of life for all affected by this detour will be minimized as much as possible by good planning and quick response to any unforeseen issues."

Per NYS DOT, the bid opening is scheduled for Thursday, May 24, 2012 and a contract is awarded within 60 days thereafter. ## Fayetteville DPW

Brush pick up will continue throughout the spring and summer seasons. Although the village asks that you keep your lawn maintained below 6 inches in length, we want to remind you that **the DPW does NOT pick up grass clippings.** Other yard waste may be put in cans, paper bags or just placed near the road, but not in plastic bags. Yard waste in converted into mulch, so please remember not to mix plastic or other items with it. Free mulch is available for pickup at the DPW Garage, 5572 North Manlius St.

Blue bins may be picked up at the DPW Garage or if you would like one delivered to you, call the garage (315-637-6065.)

Drainage and street resurfacing will begin in May and continue through June on South Burdick St., Byron, Griffin, and Washington St.

Winter sidewalk and plow damage is being repaired with topsoil and grass seed as the weather permits.

Our parks are currently being prepared for spring and summer. Maintenance of the parks is done daily.

**For the 4<sup>th</sup> of July holiday, trash pickup will be moved to Friday July 6<sup>th</sup>.**

The Village of Fayetteville is actively involved in the storm water management program. Storm water runoff becomes polluted when it flows over land contaminated with debris, chemicals and sediment. It is then discharged into water used for drinking, swimming, and fishing. Citizens can help by using fertilizers and pesticides as little as possible; never dumping anything down storm drains; seeding bare spots in the yard; directing roof runoff away from paved areas; checking vehicles for leaks of any kind and properly recycling used motor oil; and picking up after pets.

“Paving in the lower village on South Burdick St., Griffin, Washington St and other areas will take place this summer. Paving has become very expensive to do and this year is no exception. We are committed to continuing our replacement schedule and will work very hard to continue to pave as many streets as necessary to keep up on this very important part of our infrastructure.

Also in the Limestone Plaza area we are working on a drainage project near the Limestone Creek, near the Little League fields. We were given a grant to study the erosion problem in the lower village. Plans and construction documents have been drawn up and reserve funds are set aside for this project. The DPW will be physically getting into the creek to remove built up debris and sediments near the Erie Canal feeder, as well as stabilizing the banks with vegetation. This projects will be done in cooperation with the state DEC and C&S Engineers to ensure the protection of wildlife.

### Things Worth Noting

- The DPW no longer picks up televisions, computers or other electronic equipment.
- For questions on recycling that the village does not collect, call the Onondaga County Resource Recovery hotline, 453-2870, or check the OCRRA website, [www.OCRRA.org](http://www.OCRRA.org)
- The DPW is on call 24/7 for sewer problems.
- If a building permit is required for work you are having done, you are also responsible for hiring a contractor to dispose of any debris.

If you have any questions or concerns, please give us a call and we will do our best to help you.

The Fayetteville Fire Department recently held an Open House and a Car Seat Safety Inspection. They are many volunteer opportunities within the Fire Department and they are always accepting applications from anyone interested in joining. If you are interested I would invite you to stop by the Station for a visit and more information.

The Memory Garden, located at the Fayetteville Senior Center, 584 E. Genesee St., Fayetteville is available to anyone who would like visit and reflect. This Garden is dedicated and designed to be a place of solace, reflection and comfort. Memorial bricks are available along with other opportunities for memorial donations. Greetings residents of Fayetteville. The warmth of summer is upon us.

It's my hope that all residents are enjoying the many programs and events our village offers during these months of good weather. In order to enhance driver and pedestrian safety, we maintain street lights throughout the Village. If you find a street light that is out or an area that

may benefit by illumination please contact myself or the village office. We have completed our "Safe Routes to School" project last year and added 5456 feet of new sidewalks thanks to the inventory. We are proud of the walkability of our village, it is truly an asset to the community. We strive to maintain a good working relationship with our surrounding municipalities. By attending the Town of Manlius council meetings and keeping dialog open with the town elected officials we are able to ensure smooth operations and promote cooperation overall. I am encouraged with the outcome of our most recent budget.

Mayor Olson, Clerk Corsette, the trustees and most importantly the department heads have continuously managed our costs responsibly and never "printed money" due to poor policy or lack of forward thinking.

## Codes Enforcement

1. **SWIMMING POOLS:** All swimming pools including spas and hot tubs are required to have a Building Permit (Village of Fayetteville) and Electrical Permit (Town of Manlius) before being installed.
2. **GARAGE SALES:** Only two (2) signs (one on the premises and one as a direction sign) advertising a garage, household items or lawn sale are allowed in the Village of Fayetteville.
3. **ASBESTOS AND LEAD-BASED PAINT REMOVAL:** If a third-party contractor is removing asbestos or lead-based paint from your home or business, the contractor must have a Building Permit. The purpose of this requirement is to verify that the contractor is licensed and has pollution liability insurance to protect you and the Village.
4. **ADDRESS NUMBERS:** All buildings including residential and business are required to display, either upon said building or the driveway entrance, a number uniquely identifying said building's location.
5. **SMOKE AND CARBON MONOXIDE DETECTORS:** All buildings including residential and business are required to have smoke and carbon monoxide detectors. Please change batteries at least twice a year, i.e. in the fall or spring when you change your clocks.
6. **GRASS CUTTING:** The Code of the Village of Fayetteville requires all owners of any lot, yard or place within the Village to cut and remove all grass, weeds or uncultivated vegetation in excess of 6 inches (**Chapter 92, Section 92-2 amended by Local Law No. 6 of the Year 2008**).
