## News from the Mayor

The flowers and trees are starting to bloom and it's great to see everyone enjoying the outside activities in our parks and along the streets. It's truly a great time of year in central New York. A big thank you goes out to our DPW crews that are out clearing debris from the winter on our roads and parks as well as brush pick up from the neighborhoods. On behalf of the trustees, we want to thank our dedicated employees that make this happen each and every day - great job!

This is the time of year when we are putting the final touches on our next year's spending plan. In what can only be described as a challenging year fiscally, I am pleased to announce that we have been able to once again keep our current tax rate of \$ 6.70 per thousand, maintaining a stable tax rate for the last six years, despite the fact that our sales tax revenue is down 40% as well as our retirement costs being up 28%. On a brighter note, our health insurance cost went down \$63,000 because we switched to a HSA carrier versus a self-insured plan and our debt service went down \$100,000 due to debt being paid off. We also have paid off several lease payments for emergency vehicles and did not fill a vacant firefighter position. Because of this careful planning, we are able to save over \$154,000 compared to last year's fire budget. The total budget represents a reduction of 5% in spending from last year's budget or \$263,000 due to the efforts of our department heads as well as trustees and many initiatives started by our dedicated employees.

There are three main projects that are in the final planning stages and, if all goes well, will start in the summer of this year. The DOT project plan is almost finalized and we are meeting with our parks, trees and citizens committees on April 22<sup>nd</sup> to review the plans that the trustees have approved. Once the final plans are approved we will be hosting a public meeting at our first meeting in May at the village hall for public comments. This new park will have fitness and walking trails, play ground equipment for all ages to enjoy, restroom facilities, a shaded area for people to cool off and lots and lots of green space to host concerts, play Frisbee and just sit and relax by Limestone Creek. This park is going to be handicap accessible and hopefully will be enjoyed by everyone who uses it. Please come to our public meeting in May and see what all the excitement is about. This amazing project will be funded 100% from grants received from our state parks department.

The Safe Routes to School Sidewalk Grant is coming along just as fast as the DOT Park is. We have the first set of plans back from the state DOT and we have made some minor changes and sent back our comments. The plan calls for construction to begin in August with a finish date in September. The plan has sidewalks being installed on Brooklea Drive to Rt. 257 then connecting to an existing sidewalk at Townhouse Circle, sidewalks on Sheffield Lane and Salt Springs Road from Huntleigh to Redfield, and sidewalks from Southfield to Clark Road. The only part of the project that will not be done this year is the pedestrian bridge over Bishops Brook on


Route 5, due to some bridge repairs that need to be done on Route 5. (This project will be done next year in the spring.) The project is fully funded by a grant from the Federal Highway fund and CHIPS funds set aside for the past two years.

The third project underway is the firehouse renovation project. We have reviewed and approved the project for going out to bid with bids due in late May. We had three sections of the project go out for early bid (demo, asbestos and steel) and all three bids came back very competitive. So far we have received bids that are \$125,000 under our budgeted plan, so we know that the competitive bidding market is good at this time, and that is why we released the other portions of the project to go out to bid, in order to secure the best possible price for the project. The Tully Fire Department recently got their bids back for their new firehouse and the prices came back 8% below budget; by putting our project out to bid now, we hope to be able to take advantage of these favorable numbers. If we were able to get 8% savings off our budgeted plan then that would mean possibly a \$400,000 savings. This project is important to our emergency responders (volunteer and career) and anyone who has ever needed their services knows how valuable these men and women are to our community. While I know there are some who feel different, in the end we have a responsibility to provide the best possible fire and EMS services to all who need our services in their time of need, and this is exactly what this project will do- not only for our emergency responders but also for our community as a whole.

The Beautification Committee has been very busy staking out locations to put this year's flowers in the village. We have expanded the program from 30 pots last year to 60 pots this year. The program was so popular last year that the committee was able to raise over \$4500 toward the cost of the program. Along with the village and business community's support, the program will continue to get better each and every year. If you wish to make a donation to the program, please call the village hall for more information. A special thank you goes out to this dedicated group of volunteers. Thank you so much for making the village look so great!

As most of you have heard, the county executive wants to redo the sales tax formula and reduce the village's share of sales tax from approximately **\$885,000 to ZERO**. They say we need to rethink how we spend taxpayers' money along with showing the true cost of government. I agree we need to control spending. That's why we reduced total spending by over 5% this year in our budget and have kept our tax rate stable for the past 10 years. What I can't understand is the talk about showing true leadership in this time of fiscal crisis, but not dealing with the true problem facing all forms of government. I'll start with the fact the county has a \$1.1 billion dollar budget with nearly 65% of this being spent on unfunded mandates from the state and federal government. These costs are the real burden putting us in the problem we are in today, not the village's share of sales tax revenue. The villages in the county receive \$8 million or 3% of the sales tax revenue, yet we spend \$650 million a year on social services which is twice what California and Texas spend for their combined social services budget compared to what we spend in New York State for these programs.

This is the time for our county executive along with mayors, supervisors and school districts to stand together and take on these problems facing all levels of government and not just make cuts and reductions of funding to villages, towns and school districts. The county leadership hasn't dealt with the problem; it just proposed this short term gimmick that will not address the real problem and misses this perfect chance to stand up and show true leadership in these tough economic times. At the right of this page is a chart that shows the county tax burden on village residents. It costs more for county services than village services and what do we really get? Please call the county executive and tell her to restore the village share of the sales tax and join the call for reform in Albany. If we don't stand up and change the formula, we could see drastic reduction in all levels of village services. True leadership doesn't shy away from a problem; it faces it head on.



As you can see there are many challenges facing our village due to the sales tax issue, but I see these times as a defining moment in a village that was founded by residents of Fayetteville over 165 years ago. This is a time for all of us to lead and not blame other people. I choose to see the glass as half full rather than half empty. Our village has great things ahead for all of us to be proud of and take part in. This is our village and we must choose its path for the future; it is not the responsibility of the county, state or federal government to run our village. Please join all involved in running this great village and making Fayetteville the best it can be for all who live here, raise our families here and make everlasting memories to enjoy.

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Thanks again for the honor of serving you as mayor.

Recently, I purchased a home in the historic district at 113 E. Genesee St. The Historic Preservation Committee is planning on holding a contest regarding a color design for the exterior of the house. Those who are interested can devise a color palette for the painting of the house. Since it is in the historic district and under the preview of the HPC, the HPC will have a final say in the paint choices.

Spring has arrived and the flowers and trees are really showing off after a long cold winter! The Beautification Committee is looking forward to the second year of beautiful flower pots which will adorn our village. At their recommendation, this year the village purchased an additional 30 pots and contracted with Debrueque Greenhouses to grow and maintain 60 flower pots to brighten our Community. They will be placed along E. Genesee St. from Burdick Street to the Post Office and along S. Manlius Street to Beard Park. Through the generosity of community support, almost \$5000 has been donated to this project. Donations are accepted at the Village Hall if you are interested in contributing to this project. The committee is looking into other enhancements for our village and anyone with ideas should contact the committee for their consideration and recommendation by emailing through me (msmall@fayettevilley.gov) or calling the village office at 637-9864.

The Tree Commission members are partnering with the Gage Museum on April 30th at 2:00 pm to celebrate Arbor Day. This will be Fayetteville's tenth year to be recognized as an Arbor Day Foundation "Tree City USA" with the presentation of a flag which will fly from the flag pole in Limestone Plaza. The Tree Commission members have begun their work of pruning our street trees. If you see a street tree you think needs pruning or attention, please contact one of the members before you take action. Spring is a time for yard clean-up and mulching. It is very important when mulching around trees not to bank the mulch up the side of the tree. While maintaining your grass, keep the weed-eater away from the bark of the trees since the health, development and well-being of the tree is at stake! Parking on grass near a tree should also be avoided, compacting the earth around the roots is not healthy for the tree.

The Fire Department renovation project continues to move forward. Bids will be accepted on April 29th and if all goes well action will begin on the project soon after. Along with your spring cleaning, remember to check your fire extinguishers, smoke detector batteries, and carbon monoxide detectors. Be careful with the storage of gasoline for your lawn equipment and be careful as summer progresses with dry, combustible debris




We are aware there are utility poles being replaced in various parts of our village. Please note this is not a village project, but if you have any concerns you are still welcome to call the Village Office.

## CARBON MONOXIDE DETECTOR PLACEMENT:



Carbon monoxide detectors can alert you to a problem only after the CO reaches the sensor of the detector. Choose locations free of obstructions, where the alarm will stay clean and protected from adverse environmental conditions.

Carbon monoxide detectors should be located in the hallway where there is a sleeping area as well as on every level where a fuel-fired appliance is located (i.e. furnace, water heater or fireplace).

When installing a detector in the area of a fuel-fired appliance, it should be located 5-20 feet from sources of CO (i.e. furnace, water heater or fireplace). Specific distances recommended by the manufacturer are on the instructions and/or packaging of the detector.

**POOLS:** With warm weather approaching, I'd like to take a moment to inform all residents that any swimming pool capable of holding 24" or more of water requires a building permit from the Village of Fayetteville. This includes inflatable/portable pools.

**In accordance with NYS Building Code, pools require:**

- 4' fence with self closing, self-latching gate
- Pool alarm
- Electrical permit and approved third party electrical inspection
- Setback requirements for the Zoning District must be met

**\*State laws for pools were established to protect children from accidental drowning\***

**FENCES:** There are no regulations on fences in the village, other than those required for swimming pools; however, fences placed within the village cannot block the flow of water or drainage swales.

**PERMITS:** Village of Fayetteville Code §78-3(a) states: "No owner, person, corporation, association or other organization or entity shall knowingly cause, take part or assist in the construction, enlargement, alteration, repair, removal or demolition of any building or other structure nor install heating equipment except in accordance with a valid building permit for such activity issued by the Codes Enforcement Officer. ..."

Structures requiring a building permit must meet all current zoning setback regulations and all sheds 100 square feet or less must be located at least 5 feet from the property line, and 6 feet from other combustible construction for fire safety.

## OFFICE OF CODE ENFORCEMENT *CONTINUED*

**DRIVEWAY REPAIRS:** With spring comes the time that many residents surface or pave their driveways. A permit is required for all driveway construction and relocation. I would like to bring to your attention that in the event sidewalks become damaged by paver vehicles, the Village of Fayetteville will repair the sidewalk at the cost of the property owner, in accordance with Village Code §148-4. To avoid an incurred repair cost, it is recommended that you chose pavers with a liability coverage that addresses damages such as these, or that a notation be made in the estimate, prior to work, that the sidewalk is damaged including the location of damaged area(s).

**LEAD PAINT:** The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has issued new rules for contractors who disturb painted surfaces while conducting renovation, repair or painting activities in houses, childcare facilities or schools built before 1978. Traditional renovation work can create significant lead dust hazards if lead based paint is disturbed and may cause lead poisoning in children. The Renovation, Repair and Painting rule (RRP) takes effect on April 22, 2010.

### A friendly reminder to ALL DOG OWNERS:

THIS MAY SEEM LIKE COMMON SENSE TO SOME OF US, BUT THERE ARE STILL DOG OWNERS OUT THERE WHO DO NOT "GET" IT. PLEASE HELP GIVE DOG OWNERS A GOOD NAME BY FOLLOWING THESE RULES:

1. Keep your dog on a leash or in a fenced-in yard when outdoors. Even if you live where it is legal to allow your dog off-leash, you should supervise him at all times. Do not let him wander the neighborhood or get out of your sight.
2. Do not leave a barking dog outdoors. Continuous barking is not only unfair to your dog, but it is also rude and annoying to neighbors.
3. Pick up after your dog. No one wants to step in or smell that "gift" your dog left behind. Please pick it up right away and dispose of it properly.

Unfortunately, the village has been receiving many complaints regarding dogs.

Again this winter, the Department of Public Works used salt brine on the village streets. Using brine has eliminated the need for raking salt debris from lawns and has kept our roads safer during snow events. Winter sidewalk and plow damage is being repaired with topsoil and grass seed as the weather permits.



Brush pickup will continue throughout the spring and summer seasons. **The DPW does not pick up grass clippings.** Other yard waste may be placed in cans, paper bags, or just placed near the road, but not in plastic bags. Yard waste is converted to mulch, so please remember not to mix plastic or other items with it. Free mulch is available for pickup at the DPW garage, 5572 North Manlius Street.

The Village will be celebrating Memorial Day on Monday, May 31 and July 4<sup>th</sup> on Monday, July 5. These holidays will not affect our regular pickup schedule. Blue bins are available at the DPW garage. If you would like one delivered to you, call the garage.

Our parks are currently being prepared for spring and summer. All picnic tables have been repaired and repainted. General maintenance of the parks is done daily. Our “goose dog,” a Border collie, works side-by-side with the DPW Superintendent, keeping the parks free of Canada geese.

The Village of Fayetteville is actively involved in the storm water management program. Storm water runoff becomes polluted when it flows over land contaminated with debris, chemicals, and sediment. It is then discharged into water used for drinking, swimming, and fishing. Citizens can help by using fertilizers and pesticides as little as possible; never dumping anything down storm drains; seeding bare spots in the yard; directing roof runoff away from paved areas; checking vehicles for leaks of any kind and properly recycling used motor oil; and picking up after pets.

In conjunction with the Village of Manlius, an O’Brien Jetter was purchased to clear storm and sanitary sewer lines. The jetter is a yellow trailer pulled behind a DPW vehicle.

## Here are a few more things worth noting:

- The DPW no longer picks up televisions or computers.

- The DPW is on call 24/7 for sewer problems.

responsible for hiring a contractor to dispose of any debris.

Summarized below are some of the many responsibilities of this department:

**BRUSH:**

Brush is collected daily on a rotating basis throughout the village.

Brush is ground into mulch by DPW and offered for no charge to village residents.

**HARDFILL:**

Hardfill is picked up on the third Friday of every month.

Hardfill is screened through a piece of equipment manufactured at the DPW and then used for various projects in the village.

**CONSTRUCTION DEBRIS:**

Construction debris is recycled to remove products that might harm the environment.

**METAL PICKUP:**

Metal is collected on the regular trash route schedule.

DPW delivers metal to a recycling center which generates income for the village.

**TRASH:**

Trash is picked up Tuesday through Thursday on a maintained route schedule.

Trash cans are neatly returned to resident's property.

Special emergency arrangements have been made with village residents.

Tires are collected and recycled.

**RECYCLING:**

Recycling is picked up the same days as trash.

Blue bins are replaced and delivered to homeowners when requested.

**SEWERS:**

Immediate response to all calls
