A Letter

from the Mayor

Thank you again for the honor of serving you as Mayor. I look forward to 2018 and all that it will bring to our village. We have many *upcoming* projects, including potential commercial development, new upgrades to our park system, as well as other upgrades to our infrastructure and buildings. We are even eagerly awaiting a grant for a LED street light conversion project.

Our senior center campus is a very important part of the fabric of our seniors' lives and our community. The center is in need of a new activity space, larger and more functional areas for all the events that take place at the center, a more functional kitchen, and office spaces. We have been working with the senior center board and director as well as a local architect to make the necessary plans to upgrade the center. These upgrades will be partially funded by grants from several agencies.

Another project that has been in the works is Phase 4 of Canal Landing Park. The Canal Landing Park has been an incredible asset to the village since it opened over 7 years ago. We have continued to make improvements and now Phase 4 will connect Canal Landing Park to the historic Erie Canal with lighting, paved trails

and informational signs. With special thanks to Assemblyman Stirpe for awarding the village a grant, there is a Phase 5 already being planned.

Thank you to Marty Brunet and the entire Parks Commission for their dedication and time spent completing & updating our parks master plan. This project took over 18 months to complete. The finalized Fayetteville Parks Master Plan can be found on the village website.

We have been awarded round two of the Safe-Routes-To-School grant program which will allow us to complete the village sidewalk infrastructure, as well as make some necessary handicap upgrades at several intersections. If all goes to plan, the planning phase will begin soon with public input meetings hopefully by this summer. This project will ensure that every child and resident of Fayetteville will have a safe sidewalk to walk on, no matter where you live in the village.

There are three commercial projects that have been presented to our Planning and Village Boards over the past few months. I have heard from several residents on both sides of these projects. I completely understand the concerns from the residents throughout this village. I also know that our village is a special village filled with residents who love it, as I do. This shared love generates a desire to see this village thrive and not lose the character or quality of life that Fayetteville is known for. I want to assure each and every resident that we will make sure we

listen to your ideas, concerns and comments very carefully. In return I would ask that you take the time to stay engaged and let us know your thoughts. Most importantly, I ask for you to consider all sides of these projects. Since 1996 there has not been one project in our village that hasn't been without concerns from our residents, but one thing has remained the same, that when we work together, communicate, give on both sides, we will end up with a project or product that will enhance our village, not detract from it. These projects will take time to evaluate and we will take the time that we need to make sure we get this done correctly for all involved. I know I have only what is best for Fayetteville in mind every time I evaluate one of these projects.

The third season for the deer culling has started and will run through the end of March. This year new restrictions have come into effect which have modified the number of sites being used. Senator DeFrancisco has proposed new legislation to help facilitate deer management, a growing issue throughout the state. At the end of this season, we will provide an update on how we have done to date from the deer culling, deer ticks, and deer counts in the village. We know that at the beginning of this year the deer count in the village was 3 to 4 times what our stated goal is. We will continue to evaluate and monitor the program. We are encouraged that the Town of Dewitt, Onondaga Hill, Syracuse and other local communities are either working on their first year of the program or are considering starting a program. This issue does not belong to Fayetteville alone, but continues to grow in residential areas throughout Central New York.

These and many other projects are what make Fayetteville so busy and vibrant. It takes many hours of planning and countless hours of dedicated volunteer and village employees' time to make all these projects and initiatives happen. To all our residents, volunteers and businesses who make the Village of Fayetteville a place we are all proud to call home, THANK YOU.
